

Cotton & Grain Pre-Plant Conference



Rio Grande Valley Agents hosted a Cotton & Grain Pre-Plant conference at Rio Farms. Over 160 people attended this conference which featured many quality speakers who discussed topics such as RGV cotton varieties, market updates, nutrient and weed management, and boll weevil eradication programs.

Grain Sorghum Variety Trial

Cameron County Agriculture Agent planted a nine variety grain sorghum research demonstration plot in La Feria. Each of the 9 varieties were planted on 6 rows and replicated three times. Each variety will be measured for performance standards such as yield, bushel weight, and moisture content.





Cotton Result Demonstration



Cameron County Agriculture Agent planted a 10 variety cotton research demonstration plot in Harlingen. Each of the 10 varieties were planted on 6 rows and replicated 3 times. Each of these varieties will be measured for performance standards such as yield and fiber quality.

Coastal & Marine

Oyster Aquaculture

Oyster Aquaculture is now allowed in Texas and Texas Parks & Wildlife is developing regulations. We held a meeting in January for stakeholders in conjunction with UTRGV, attended by 40 in person and online. The Laguna Madre is being considered a culture site for oysters and we are researching the feasibility with UTRGV.



Texas Master Naturalists

Two Texas Master Naturalist chapters serve Cameron County. South Texas Border and Rio Grande Valley. They began classes in January for 50 trainees to become certified as Master Naturalists.

Trainees are required to take 40 hours of instruction, composed of classroom and advanced training, and complete a minimum of 40 hours of chapter approved volunteer service.

The trainees are presently completing classes on line to respect social distancing. All chapter meetings are now conducted with Zoom.

This quarter our chapter members reached 3,040 adults and 1,435 youth in educational programs.

Over 400 Master Naturalist from the two chapters performed 4,200 hours of volunteer service valued at \$106,806!





Commercial Fishing In 2019, the Cameron County shrimp fleet based out of Brownsyille and Port Isabel produced in

Brownsville and Port Isabel produced 10.4 million pounds valued at \$45 million, significantly down from the previous 5 year average of 13 million pounds valued at \$59 million. We have mixed news with the onset of COVID-19. H2B workers

We have mixed news with the onset of COVID-19. HZB workers which crew our vessels during the Texas offshore shrimp season are in limbo about returning to the US.

Currently, vessels fishing out of Brownsville and Port Isabel are reporting good catches. Shrimp prices are down and several of our vessels returning to port since March 23 were not able to sell their shrimp due to the decline in restaurant demand.

Part of our fleet fishing pink shrimp in Florida report high

demand and good prices! Shrimp vessel owners have been concerned about LNG tankers inhibiting ingress and egress in the Brownsville Ship Channel. The US Coast Guard announced they lifted the security zones

Our shrimp vessels will be able to freely move in and out of port when LNG plants begin operations. Cameron County's blue crap fishery is booming in spite of COVID!

Crab fishermen are selling most of their catch to Baltimore for

Turtle Excluder Device and Bycatch Reduction Device. TED and BRD, compliance assistance will continue with shelter-in-place requirements abate.







Recreational Fishing





Recreational fishing was active in March with a good run of sheepshead around the jetty at Isla Blanca.
After March 23, fishing was curtailed due to COVID19. Bait shrimp production is down due to decreased demand. County and city public boat ramps and beaches are closed. Party boats and guides are not fishing to respect social distancing.

Economic impacts are currently being assessed. There is good news.

The reduction in fishing pressure should result in a boom to fishing when restrictions are lifted!

Shrimp Aquaculture





Shrimp aquaculture has a positive outlook in Cameron County for 2020. A large farm on the Arroyo Colorado currently has active shrimp hatchery and is stocking ponds for harvest in early summer.

Owners believe the market will be strong at harvest time and have the potential to produce over three million pounds this year!

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
