157 Cameron County adults completed the GNHC program. More than 3858 pounds were produced in 11 community gardens.



Agriculture

Forage Production for Agriculture Producers:

Agriculture Production Committee hosted a Forage Management program series. Participants in the program series participated in pre-post-test with 90% considering making operational changes.





Rio Grande 706 Beef: Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr and Willacy County:

Participants reported owning 5,864 head of cattle with 3.36 fold increase in knowledge, increase in 7 different best management practice which equates to \$131, 940 economic impact in four county participation

Agriculture and Production/Nutrient Management:
This year, a total of 352 soil samples representing 2261 acres of agriculture production fields in Cameron County were submitted to the soil testing laboratory in College Station for analysis. Fertilizer recommendation resulted in an average cost savings of \$25 per acre, depending on crop and management history. Soil Campaign translates of \$136,258.00 economic impact reduction of fertilizer for 2017 year in those acreages that participated in the Soil Campaign.





Pesticide Safety:

621 individuals attended 33 group sessions with 1900 hours of instruction. The economic value of the Continuing Education Units earned is estimated to be over \$49,000. A total of 63 persons attended the five-hour course which is required by TDA.

Texas Master Naturalists

The Rio Grande Valley Chapter and South Texas Border Chapter combined volunteer force of 213 naturalists contributed 26,461 hours of volunteer time providing education, outreach, and service dedicated toward the beneficial management of natural areas and resources in Cameron County and the Rio Grande Valley. The total value of this volunteer time is \$638,769 for our community. Over 200 acres were restored as natural areas by the chapters this year.

Turtle Excluder Device (TED) Project

The TED project was successful this quarter with 223 shrimp vessel crewmen aboard 66 vessels educated in TED compliance resulting in increased in sea turtle survival.



Texas Coastal Naturalists

Texas Coastal Naturalists were involved in rescuing over 60 sea turtles in the Lower Laguna Madre in December and were actively assisting in saving downed pelicans at the Bahia Grande during hard northers. Texas dodged red tide this year and we now have a new tool for our Red Tide Rangers, the HABscope to monitor concentrations should we experience blooms in the future.





Cameron County Family & Community Health 2017



During 2017, 362 Cameron County adults completed the BLT A Fresh Start to a Healthier You! Series. Of those 342 participants, completed the 30-day follow-up survey which allows us to assess the extent that targeted behaviors were adopted

Conducted multiple parent education workshop series' in Cameron County utilizing the Parenting Connections curriculum. Two hundred and forty-eight (248) single session parenting evaluations were completed by participants. Eighty-five (86) parents and/or other relatives completed the 4-week program





Family & Community Health agent and partnership with Specialists and San Benito CISD hosted When Sean Speaks with 4302 students on April 25, 26,27,2017. Other partners San Benito Police Department.

17 individuals enrolled in the 4 week sewing class and successfully completed the program. Two master clothing volunteer taught the classes. Topics included Parts of Sewing Machine and their functions, working with different fabrics, Basic Clothing Construction, sewing kitchen pot holders, and blanket





CEP agent held the 6 week nutrition program "Choose Health: Food, Fun & Fitness". Over 40 youth participants attended and graduated from the program where they learned lessons such as how to read a nutrition label to make healthier food choices, the benefit of drinking less sugary drinks.

Throughout the 2017 year, over 240 parent and student participants from the Harlingen Consolidated School District and the San Benito School District attended presentations from the Strengthening Families curriculum wherein they learned tips on how to communicate better with one another in order to strengthen the family unit.

According to the National Center for Health Statistics, 62 percent of adults American were overweight in 2000. In addition, physical in activity is associated with an increased risk of number of chronic health conditions including cardiovascular disease, diabetes, some cancers, High blood pressure as well as overweight and obesity. Fortunately, Cameron County AgriLife Extension agents have the knowledge and expertise to provide resources that will help encourage a healthier lifestyle and behavior change.

HEALTHY SOUTH TEXAS COALTION MEMBERS, MATER WELLNESS AND VOLUNTEERS

The coalition members (8), Master Wellness (3) and volunteers (10) and Youth Ambassadors (6) helped and supported the implementation of Dinner Tonight and Walk Across Texas.



121 participants walked 23,334 miles and 308 student participants walked 31,821 miles. It is estimated that 16 adults who completed the WAT! Program could avoid or delay the onset of diabetes through increased physical activity. The potential economic impact for Cameron County WAT! Participants is approximately \$1,275,890



DINNER TONIGHT/NUTRITION EDUCATION

Healthy eating begins at home and with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Services Dinner Tonight! program, we make it easier for people to plan and cook healthy meals. Recognizing the challenges of busy families, this program uses face-to-face cooking schools and an all-access website to teach cooking tips and techniques, provide reliable nutrition information, address food safety concerns, and give guidance on food preparation.
