WEIGHMASTER TRAINING

For two evenings in May, we taught **24 candidates** (10 from the Rio Grande Valley) to become **Fishing Tournament Weighmasters**. The online course covered all aspects, including challenges fishing tournament weighmasters may face when working a tournament. SHRIMP SEASON

The **Texas Shrimp Season Opening** is **scheduled for July 15**, and environmental conditions this past spring give us an idea we should have excellent production! Brown shrimp are our target species and respond well to the prevailing drought conditions along the Texas coast this spring. We are however faced with some tough challenges to the shrimp industry:

- Many of our vessels cannot get crews due to an allotment of too few H2B Visa workers we depend on. Most American citizens avoid these jobs, and we must recruit workers from Central America and Mexico.
- The preceding Gulf of Mexico white shrimp season was so bountiful, buyers have huge supplies in cold storage and prices for the upcoming brown shrimp crop are predicted to be low.
- Diesel fuel costs are almost double what it was last year!
- Imports from India, Ecuador and Indonesia increased 14.5% during the first 4 months of 2022 over last year, further depressing prices.
- These issues combined are a perfect storm with potential of economic disaster in this realm of uncertainty for the fleet this season.

Agriculture

COTTON AND GRAIN SCOUTING SCHOOL

County Extension Agents and the IPM Agent conducted a cotton and grain sorghum scouting school. This training was focused primarily on educating industry personnel on how to identify pests and disease problems in cotton and grain. Participants were taught to make informed decisions regarding infestation thresholds in relation to the economics of spraying their crops.

TEXAS A&M AGRILIFE DIRECTOR VISIT

County Extension Administrator planned and coordinated a county visit from Texas A&M AgriLife Director, Dr. Rick Avery. Dr. Avery's visit included participating in a Strong People Strong Body program, visiting with Master Gardener and Master Naturalist Volunteers, Visiting the County Ecotourism Center, and visiting with two staff members of County Commissioners David Garza and Gus Ruiz.



RGV POULTRY AND GOAT WORKSHOP

County Agents conducted a poultry and goat workshop that was designed for small acreage producers. Topics of discussion included: feeding, nutrition, facilities, health, and disease management. USDA-FSA personnel also discussed loan programs that are being offered to small acreage producers. Participants gained knowledge that would better prepare them for raising poultry for eggs and meat production, as well as raising goats for milk and meat purposes.

CORN AND GRAIN SORGHUM FIELD DAY

County Agents conducted a grain sorghum and corn field day at Fike Farms. Two CEU's were given out at this program which included an IPM presentation and a Laws and Regulations presentation. Participants then caravanned to the demonstration fields in order to hear discussion for seed representatives and their varieties.

CHOOSE HEALTHY

Eight grade students from Stillman Middle School in Brownsville participated in the Choose Healthy 4-week nutrition. Students learned about basic nutrition and wellness principles. MyPlate, living a balanced life, making healthy choices, and healthy beverages. Each student enrolled in the program received a Choose Healthy booklet along with educational reinforcement items and tasted easy and nutritious food recipes. 126 students completed the 4-session program.

COLOR ME HEALTHY FOR SNAP-ED

The Color Me Healthy for SNAP-ed kindergartener's nutrition program was implemented in collaboration with Prairie View A&M FCH Agent, Gloria Carter and Better Living for Texans – Extension Agent, Nidia Garcia at Lamar Elementary Dual Language Academy in June 2022. A total of 66 students completed the program during the Harlingen CISD Bilingual Summer School. Students learned about trying and tasting new fruits and vegetables, increasing physical activity, and identifying foods and beverages that are healthy choices for teeth and bones.








LEARN, GROW, EAT AND GO!

A TASTE OF LATIN AMERICAN HERITAGE

Heritage" is a plant-based nutrition & cooking program created by Oldways: Health
Through Heritage. Participants were introduced to Latin American heritage foods'
vibrant history, culture, and nutrition. They also participated in cooking demonstrations
where they learned how to cook and/or incorporate the foods they learned about into
their meal planning. Over 30 participants completed the program.

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Expanded Food And Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP)

SUPPORTING TEXAS FAMILIES WITH GREATEST NEED SINCE 1969

The Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) helps young families and youth with limited resources—those most at risk to suffer from hunger, food insecurity, and the inability to connect with available support systems. EFNEP offers practical lessons in basic nutrition, food preparation, food budget management, and food safety in settings convenient for the participants. Program graduates reflect significant, lasting improvement in eating behaviors and healthy food habits. Texas has a need for EFNEP—2019 data show that 16 percent of Texas families with children under the age of 18 were living below poverty level, compared to 14 percent of U.S. families.

EFNEP MAKES A REAL DIFFERENCE

Adult Program

Using hands-on experiences, EFNEP adult participants complete at least a **six-lesson series** on stretching food dollars, improving eating habits, and practicing food safety principles. As a result of participation in EFNEP, participants will learn to prepare more meals and snacks at home, be more active, control portion size, and have more energy.

Youth Program

The EFNEP Youth program is directed toward low-income school-age youth. These students participate in a series of fun and educational lessons on good nutrition and food safety as part of summer programs and classroom and after-school activities. Through fun and engaging activities, youth learn to build a healthy plate, set limits on sugar, fats, and sodium, be active, food safety, and to practice healthy behaviors.

EFNEP REACHES DIVERSE AUDIENCES

In Texas, ethnically diverse EFNEP nutrition assistants reach youth and adult groups whose principal language may be English or Spanish.

During the 2nd Quarter of 2022:

- 255 families enrolled in EFNEP
- 113 participants graduated
- 754 youth contacts were made through the EFNEP Youth program
- 440 youth contacts graduated from the EFNEP Youth program
- 100% of EFNEP participants have children under the age of 19
- 79% of families were at or below 100% of federal poverty level
- 81% of families enrolled in one or more food assistance

VOLUNTEERS STRENGTHEN EFNEP

During the 2nd Quarter of 2022, **22 volunteers donated 344.5 hours of work to EFNEP in Texas.** At the Texas rate of **\$26.43/hr**, this volunteerism has a minimum dollar value of **\$9,105.14**. Volunteers make a difference in their own communities and contribute to EFNEP's continued success.

COST-BENEFIT OF EFNEP

Studies have shown that for every \$1 spent on EFNEP, \$10 were estimated to be saved in health care costs and \$2 saved in food costs by participants. For Texas, this is \$43 million in estimated health care cost savings and almost \$8.6 million in food costs.

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Cooperative Extension 4-H & Youth Development

HEROES 4-HEALTH





Cooperative Extension
Program agents collaborated
to implement the Heroes 4Health youth nutrition
program series at two
locations: Jubilee AcademyHarlingen, TX and Jo Nelson
Middle School-Santa Rosa, TX.





A total of **435** youth completed six or more hours of nutrition education sessions from the Choose Health: Food, Fun, and Fitness curriculum, learning about the importance of adopting heathy diet and activity-related habits. Student also observed and tasted various nutritious recipes. Parents and families were also engaged by conducting a virtual family presentation with an opportunity to "cook-along" and taste a healthy recipe. Family newsletters were also sent home after each lesson.

JUNTOS 4-H



The goal of this 5-year grant program is to target dropout prevention by focusing on college preparation for Latinx youth and their parents in Cameron County. In this first year, Berta Cabaza Middle School has recruited 3 volunteers and 35 youth to implement the Juntos 4-H program. In April, CEP-4H agent, CEP Regional 4H specialist, and BCMS afterschool coordinator attended a state Juntos training.

PARD 4-H CLUB OUTDOOR ADVENTURES







The Brownsville Parks & Recreation Department 4-H Club has been implementing the Project Wild curriculum during their Outdoor Adventures Summer Camp, in collaboration with the CEP-4-H agent. During six sessions conducted this quarter, **25** youth have learned about various outdoor and wildlife concepts such as birding, art in nature, and wildlife habitats. This camp will continue through the end of August.

TECH CHANGEMAKERS PROGRAM
